Subject : EU – US Summit 2004 Outlook - Overview of EU-side Approach

This background paper is prepared jointly by the Presidency and Commission to assist discussion on Summit Preparation at COTRA on 29 April. It sets out the context and timeline for the Summit, explores possible agenda items and outcomes and in particular sets out possible EU perspectives. Further discussions on Summit preparation will take place in the coming period based on discussions and developments between EU and US interlocutors.

1. Context

The EU-US Summit will take place in Ireland on 25/26 June.

The agenda will cover the usual breadth of regional and security issues as well as trade and economic questions. This note is an attempt to identify the relevant topics of interest with a view to ensure the necessary focus in the run-up to the meeting.

Twelve months ago the Summit took place against the backdrop of a perceived all-time low in transatlantic relations following the war in Iraq. The Summit at that time worked to demonstrate that, notwithstanding differences, cooperation continued in a number of areas - political, economic and security – as was demonstrated by the texts on specific issues agreed at the 2003 Summit.

Since last year there have been a number of important developments impacting on the relationship. This will be the first summit of the enlarged EU with the US. The probable agreement on the constitutional treaty, at the European Council of 17-18 June, will give fresh impetus and visibility to the EU foreign policy. The EU has agreed important policies relating to the European Security Strategy and the fight against terrorism. It also adopted Declaration on Transatlantic Relations in December 2003. In the past year there has been continuing good cooperation with the US on regional, security and economic issues.

2. Timeline to Summit

A first discussion will take place at COTRA on 29 April, covering the broad lines, issues, objectives and strategies for the Summit.

Prospects for the main agenda items will be discussed at the EU-US Task Force on 6 May. A debriefing and further discussion will take place at COTRA on 13 May.

In parallel COREPER will have an orientation debate on the broad political, security and economic backdrop to the Summit on 13 May with a view to discussion in Council on 17 May.

Discussion of possible texts, agendas and outcomes will be pursued in COTRA on 27 May and 10 and 22 June.

A further Task Force will take place on 27 May and an SLG on 3 June, and there will be further meetings as appropriate in the run up to the Summit.

An important dimension also is the G8 Summit on 8-10 June and the NATO Summit on 28/29 June.

5. Communication Strategy

As mentioned earlier, the context surrounding this Summit is quite different from last year's and is a far more promising one. At the same time, the year 2004 is a transition year in many respects both in Washington and Brussels. **NOT DECLASSIFIED**

This partnership remains the indispensable one not only for the transatlantic community but for the world. It is based on the two pillars of prosperity and security. The Summit will register concrete steps in the strengthening of the transatlantic economic partnership as well as in the enhancement of the EU-US security dialogue. The themes, whether in the form of statements, fact-sheets or agreed press lines, should focus on the economy and on security in the broader sense (fight against terrorism, non-proliferation, co-operation in the area of HIV-AIDS). Several fact sheets would be envisaged: economy, security, 'the enlarged EU and the US', Wider Middle East, Galileo.
