We have registered your application of 29 January 2013 for access to document 8448/2/12 REV 2.

Thank you for your interest.

The General Secretariat of the Council has examined your application on the basis of the Regulation on access to documents (hereafter "the Regulation")¹ and of the specific provisions in the Council's Rules of Procedure², and has come to the following conclusion:

Document **8448/2/12 REV 2** is a note from the Presidency to the delegations concerning the proposal for a Directive of the European Parliament and of the Council on the use of Passenger Name Record data for the prevention, detection, investigation and prosecution of terrorist offences and serious crime. In this note, the Presidency provided a state of play of the discussions following the meeting of the Permanent Representatives Committee (Coreper) of 18 April 2012.

On 6 November 2007 the Commission adopted a proposal for a Council Framework Decision on the use of Passenger Name Record (PNR) data for law enforcement purposes¹. This proposal was discussed extensively in the Multidisciplinary Group on Organised Crime (MDG).

On the entry into force of the Treaty of Lisbon on 1 December 2009, the Commission proposal, which had at that time not yet been adopted by the Council, was no longer appropriate. The above-mentioned proposal for a Directive of the European Parliament and of the Council takes the place of the 2007 proposal and is based on the provisions of the Treaty on the Functioning of the European Union (TFEU). The new proposal was extensively discussed in the Multidisciplinary Group on Organised Crime (MDG), as well as in the Working Party on General Matters including Evaluation (GENVAL) and in Coreper. On 26 and 27 April 2012, the Justice and Home Affairs Council established a general approach on the draft Directive, which is now to serve as the basis for negotiations with the European Parliament. The Council is currently awaiting commencement of these negotiations. However, this does not mean that discussions within the Council itself have been concluded. Even after the Council has entered into negotiations with the European Parliament, discussions on this subject will continue in the Council preparatory bodies before the Directive can be finally adopted by the Council.

For the Council to find compromise solutions and achieve progress on difficult questions it is essential that delegations can express their views internally within the Council's preparatory bodies. Disclosure of the delegations' positions while negotiations are still on-going would jeopardise this possibility and, in the opinion of the General Secretariat, would significantly undermine the Council's decision-making process.

As there is no evidence suggesting an overriding public interest to warrant disclosure of the document in question, the General Secretariat has concluded that protection of the decision-making process outweighs the public interest in disclosure. The General Secretariat therefore does not consider itself to be in a position, by virtue of the first subparagraph of Article 4(3) of the Regulation (protection of the Council's decision-making process), to grant your application for full access.

However, pursuant to Article 4(6) of the Regulation, you may have access to those parts of the document which are not covered by this exception.

Information on available remedies

In accordance with Article 7(2) of the Regulation you may, within 15 days, make a confirmatory application asking the Council to reconsider its position¹.
