The Council held an orientation debate on the Commission's proposal on the basis of three questions prepared by the Presidency and contained in doc. 14540/12. The Ministers discussed:

- 1) the effectiveness and enforceability of the proposed regulation, and its relation to the competitiveness of EU flags,
- 2) the possibility to introduce or not additional requirements beyond the Hong Kong Convention, and
- the detailed provisions on penalties, access to justice and enforcement contained in the 3) proposal.

Many Member States generally welcomed the proposed regulation as a tool to promote the timely implementation of the Hong Kong Convention. Some of them, however, expressed serious concerns as to the appropriateness of regional measures in the current situation, where the Convention is not yet in force, and to the possible consequences for the European fleet. Additionally, it was underlined that work has to continue on legally sound and enforceable solutions for some of the complex issues raised in the proposal.

In relation to the second question, most Member States emphasized the need for consistency of the draft regulation with the Hong Kong Convention and in particular for clear rules on the future review of the Regulation, once the Convention enters into force.

Finally, a majority of Member States pointed out that they consider it not appropriate to include specific provisions on access to justice in the draft regulation as these are already covered by the existing EU legislation. Many Member States also opposed the inclusion of specify measures on penalties.

The <u>Commission</u> noted the different views expressed and the <u>Presidency</u> indicated that it will prepare a progress report on this matter.
