<u>The Chair</u>, following contacts with some delegations since the last meeting of the Working Party, suggested to delete the second paragraph of the reply to question 9.

Some delegations expressed their satisfaction. One delegation requested that the issue on possible change of the Council's rules of procedure to adapt them to the Access Info Europe ruling should be discussed in the near future. The Chair suggested that the WPI reverts to this issue after the summer break.

<u>The General Secretariat</u> suggested a few minor changes in the draft reply in order to take into account some delegations' comments. These changes were accepted by the Working Party.

<u>The Chair</u> indicated that the revised version of the draft reply will be issued and that a formal written procedure will be launched on Monday 17 July till Wednesday 19 July. He reminded the delegations that as it will be a formal written procedure, each delegation will have to reply.

b) Open Data

<u>The delegations</u> were informed about the state of play concerning the draft replies to these three confirmatory applications.

3. Communication/Information policy

a) Communication strategy and priorities of the Estonian Presidency

<u>The Presidency</u> outlined its citizen-oriented communication strategy linked to its four priorities: "An open and innovative European economy", "A safe and secure Europe", "A digital Europe and the free movement of data" and "An inclusive and sustainable Europe".

Moreover, the Presidency indicated that it will focus on:

- presence in all main social networks and smooth information flow through its portal https://www.eu2017.ee/
- facilitating the implementation of cross-border digital projects (seeking in particular digital solutions for the environment)
- the organisation of a Digital summit in Tallinn on 29 September 2017.

Finally, the Presidency indicated that, in the spirit of the Bratislava Declaration, it will promote inclusiveness and engage with wide public, think tanks and schools.

The French delegation welcomed the Presidency's presentation and its intentions to strengthen communication on the EU's values. It praised the multilingual aspects of the Presidency's web portal and its outreach efforts and assured its support to addressing citizens' protection and to the implementation of the Commission's White Paper and its reflection papers on the future of Europe.

WPI's communication agenda for the second semester **b**)

The Chair:

- underlined that the WPI is the competent Council body in charge of communication, a cross-cutting task differentiating it from other working parties in the different policy areas
- referred to the informal exchange of views held on 14 July 2016 to discuss with delegations how to revamp the WPI's communication agenda and improve the WPI's working methods, increase benefit to delegations and foster follow-up and cooperation

recalled the main topics on which the WPI focused in the last year: crisis
 communication on migration, StratCom or the forward-looking communication
 agenda around the 60th anniversary of the Rome treaties.

<u>The Chair</u> indicated that he had recently reflected with the former and current presidency on how to continue to stimulate strategic communication discussions and analysis, to increasingly meet delegations' expectations.

Accordingly, he envisages that the WPI:

- continue focusing on crisis contingencies and topics of immediate relevance to the
 Council and European Council work and in line with the current presidency's
 priorities
- host exchanges of views and best practices on how MS are communicating
 Europe to their citizens and how to strengthen communication capacities, taking
 into account the ongoing digital transformation of the communication processes.

Along this line, twice a year (ideally in January and September), the WPI will be the delegations' forum to exchange information on the main lines of communication planned or executed on EU matters.

<u>The Presidency</u> agreed with <u>the Chair</u>'s views on the WPI's agenda and will welcome further discussions and share of know-how, experiences and ideas, as they will enable presidencies to draw much inspiration for their work.

<u>The Presidency</u> also indicated that the communication session of the next WPI meeting on 26 September will focus on follow-up to the communication aspects of the Bratislava Declaration.

The Chair highlighted the politically clear, actionable language of the Declaration, which gave a clear tasking in stressing the need to improve mutual communication among Member States, EU institutions, and especially with our citizens. One year after, the WPI will look at what has collectively been done thus far to implement that tasking, and what remains to be done.

<u>Several delegations</u> intervened to support <u>the Chair</u> and <u>the Presidency</u>:

- welcoming the Chair's proposal to organise two WPI forum-type discussions per year and to focus the follow-up to Bratislava
- stressing the need to safeguard and reinforce the partnership instruments between
 Member States and the institutions in the field of communication
- underlining that communication on the EU should be nuanced to take due account of national sensibilities and priorities
- recommending focus on core issues such as countering Euro-scepticism and monitoring public opinion trends
- welcoming GSC initiatives in the field of media monitoring, visitor's policy, press'
 releases and audio-visual production
- recommending WPI early planning, advance circulation of work documents and more organic work on specific themes.

<u>The Chair</u> took note of the Estonian Presidency's and delegations' comments and suggestions and indicated that, by the end of July 2017, <u>the General Secretariat</u> will circulate a short paper to structure and facilitate discussion at the September meeting.
