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**COMMISSION IMPLEMENTING DECISION**

**of 10.1.2018**

**granting an authorisation for a use of acids generated from chromium trioxide and their oligomers under Regulation (EC) No 1907/2006 of the European Parliament and of the Council (Robert Bosch GmbH)**

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THE EUROPEAN COMMISSION,

Having regard to the Treaty on the Functioning of the European Union,

Having regard to Regulation (EC) No 1907/2006 of the European Parliament and of the Council of 18 December 2006 concerning the Registration, Evaluation, Authorisation and Restriction of Chemicals (REACH), establishing a European Chemicals Agency, amending Directive 1999/45/EC and repealing Council Regulation (EEC) No 793/93 and Commission Regulation (EC) No 1488/94 as well as Council Directive 76/769/EEC and Commission Directives 91/155/EEC, 93/67/EEC, 93/105/EC and 2000/21/EC<sup>1</sup>, and in particular Article 64(8) thereof,

Whereas:

- (1) Acids generated from chromium trioxide and their oligomers are listed in Annex XIV to Regulation (EC) No 1907/2006 and therefore subject to the authorisation requirement referred to in Article 56(1)(a) of that Regulation.
- (2) On 18 November 2015, an application for authorisation was submitted by Robert Bosch GmbH ('the applicant') in accordance with Article 62 of Regulation (EC) No 1907/2006 for the use of acids generated from chromium trioxide and their oligomers in hard chrome plating for gasoline and diesel injection applications.
- (3) On 22 December 2016, the Commission received the opinions of the Committee for Risk Assessment ('RAC') and the Committee for Socio-economic Analysis ('SEAC') of the European Chemicals Agency<sup>2</sup> on the application pursuant to the second subparagraph of Article 64(5) of Regulation (EC) No 1907/2006.
- (4) In its opinion, the RAC confirmed that it is not possible to determine a derived no-effect level (DNEL) for the carcinogenic properties of acids generated from chromium trioxide and their oligomers in accordance with Section 6.4 of Annex I to Regulation (EC) No 1907/2006 and therefore acids generated from chromium trioxide and their oligomers are non-threshold substances. In accordance with Article 60(3)(a) of Regulation (EC) No 1907/2006, Article 60(2) of that Regulation does not apply to those substances, and therefore an authorisation may only be granted on the basis of Article 60(4) of that Regulation.

- (5) In its opinion, the RAC concluded that the risk management measures and operational conditions as described in the application are appropriate and effective in limiting the risk to workers and the general population that could potentially be exposed via the environment.
- (6) In its opinion, the SEAC concluded that the overall socio-economic benefits arising from the use of acids generated from chromium trioxide and their oligomers applied for outweigh the risks to human health or the environment arising from that use and that there are no suitable alternative substances or technologies in terms of their technical and economic feasibility for the applicant before the sunset date. The Commission, having evaluated the SEAC assessment, concurs with this conclusion.
- (7) Based on the RAC and the SEAC opinions, and in accordance with Article 60(4) of Regulation (EC) No 1907/2006, it is appropriate to authorise the use of acids generated from chromium trioxide and their oligomers applied for, provided that the risk management measures and operational conditions described in the application and in particular in the chemical safety report<sup>3</sup> are fully applied.
- (8) In its opinion, the SEAC recommended the review period referred to in Article 60(9)(e) of Regulation (EC) No 1907/2006 to be set at twelve years. The recommended review period takes into account the RAC assessment of the risk of the continued use of the substance and its conclusion that the risk management measures and operational conditions are appropriate and effective in limiting the risks, that the socio-economic benefits of continued use outweigh the risks by several orders of magnitude, the lack of suitable alternatives before the sunset date, and the likely timeframe needed for the applicant and his customers down the supply chain to develop and implement a suitable alternative, should one become available, in light of the long production span of the application and the need for redesigning the existing motor systems in case a suitable alternative become available.
- (9) In view of the RAC and the SEAC opinion, the Commission considers appropriate that, as regards the use of acids generated from chromium trioxide and their oligomers applied for, the review period referred to in Article 60(9)(e) of Regulation (EC) No 1907/2006 is set at 12 years as from the sunset date set out in Annex XIV to Regulation (EC) No 1907/2006.
- (10) In their opinions, the RAC and the SEAC did not recommend any additional conditions or monitoring arrangements.
- (11) The language used for the description of the risk management measures and operational conditions included in the application for authorisation may be different from the official language(s) of the Member State(s) where the use(s) take(s) place. Therefore, in order to facilitate the enforcement of the authorisation, it is appropriate to include a monitoring arrangement requiring the authorisation holder to submit, upon request, a succinct summary of those risk management measures and operational conditions in an official language of the Member State(s) concerned.
- (12) This Decision does not affect the obligation of the authorisation holder to ensure that the use does not adversely affect human health or the environment pursuant to Article 1(3) of Regulation (EC) No 1907/2006. Furthermore, it does not affect either the obligation of the authorisation holder to ensure that the exposure to the substance is reduced to as low a level as is technically and practically possible pursuant to Article 60(10) of Regulation (EC) No 1907/2006 or the obligation of the employer to reduce

the use of a carcinogen or mutagen at the place of work, in particular by replacing it, in so far as is technically possible in accordance with Article 4(1) of Directive 2004/37/EC of the European Parliament and of the Council<sup>4</sup>, or to prevent and reduce exposure in accordance with Article 5 of that Directive. Furthermore, this Decision is without prejudice to the application of the EU Directives in the area of health and safety at work, in particular Council Directive 89/391/EEC<sup>5</sup>, Council Directive 98/24<sup>6</sup>, Directive 2004/37 of the European Parliament and of the Council<sup>7</sup>, Council Directive 92/85/EEC<sup>8</sup> and Council Directive 94/33/EC<sup>9</sup>.

- (13) This Decision is without prejudice to any obligation to comply with emission limit values set in accordance with Directive 2010/75/EU of the European Parliament and of the Council<sup>10</sup> and Directive 2008/50/EC of the European Parliament and of the Council<sup>11</sup>, as well as with emission limit values set to achieve compliance with the environmental quality standards established both in Directive 2008/105/EC of the European Parliament and of the Council<sup>12</sup> and by Member States in accordance with Directive 2000/60/EC of the European Parliament and of the Council<sup>13</sup>. Compliance with the provisions of this Decision should not necessarily result in compliance with emission limit values or environmental quality standards under other Union legislation, which may include separate or more onerous requirements.
- (14) The measures provided for in this Decision are in accordance with the opinion of the Committee established under Article 133 of Regulation (EC) No 1907/2006,

HAS ADOPTED THIS DECISION:

*Article 1*

An authorisation is granted in accordance with Article 60(4) of Regulation (EC) No 1907/2006 for the following use of acids generated from chromium trioxide and their oligomers, EC No 231-801-5 and CAS No 7738-94-5, provided that the risk management measures and operational conditions described in the chemical safety report submitted pursuant to Article 62(4)(d) of that Regulation are fully applied:

REACH/17/35/0	Hard chrome plating for gasoline and diesel injection applications

*Article 2*

As regards the authorised use of acids generated from chromium trioxide and their oligomers, the review period referred to in Article 60(9)(e) of Regulation (EC) No 1907/2006 shall expire on 21 September 2029.

*Article 3*

The following monitoring arrangement shall apply:

- the authorisation holder shall submit, upon request, to the competent authority of the Member State where the authorised use takes place a succinct summary of the applicable risk management measures and operational conditions described in the chemical safety report in an official language of that Member State;

*Article 4*
