*Analysis of the final compromise text with a view to agreement*

The Committee endorsed the text of the final compromise and mandated the Presidency to inform the European Parliament that, should the European Parliament adopt its position at first reading in accordance with this compromise (subject to revision by the legal linguists), the Council would approve the European Parliament's position and the act shall be adopted.

### Statement by the Commission

"Article 3(7), second subparagraph, of Directive 96/71/EC as amended by the Directive adopted today, lays down that allowances specific to the posting shall be considered to be part of remuneration, unless they are paid in reimbursement of expenditure actually incurred on account of the posting, such as expenditure on travel, board and lodging. It also provides that "[t]he employer shall, without prejudice to paragraph 1(gb), reimburse the worker for such expenditure in accordance with national law and/or practice applicable to the employment relationship of the posted worker".

The Commission understands that the "national law and/or practice applicable to the employment relationship of the posted worker" is in principle the national law and /or practice of the home Member State, unless otherwise determined in accordance with EU rules on private international law. In the light of the Court's judgment in Case C-396/13 (paragraph 59), reimbursement also covers the situation where the employer defrays costs of the workers without the latter having first to pay them and then seek to have them reimbursed.

The Commission notes that the Directive adopted today foresees that, because of the highly mobile nature of work in international road transport, the revised rules on posting will apply to that sector only from the date of application of a legislative act amending Directive 2006/22/EC as regards enforcement requirements and laying down specific rules with respect to Directive 96/71/EC and Directive 2014/67/EC for posting drivers in the road transport sector.

The Commission calls on the European Parliament and the Council to adopt that act swiftly in order to adapt the rules to the specific needs of posted workers in the sector while ensuring proper functioning of the internal road transport market.

Until the date of application of the sector-specific legislative act, Directive 96/71/EC and Directive 2014/67/EU remain in force in road transport. These legislative acts do not apply to road transport operations which do not constitute posting.

The Commission will continue to closely monitor the proper enforcement of the current rules in particular in the road transport sector and where appropriate take action."

### Statement by Hungary and Poland

"We are committed to the protection of workers, to combatting fraud and abuses, as well as safeguarding the integrity of the Internal Market. We believe that Directive 96/71/EC concerning the posting of workers in the framework of the provision of services (hereafter: Directive 96/71/EC) created a delicate balance between the protection of workers and the freedom to provide services. We regret that the modification of that Directive was proposed before the effects of the application of its Enforcement Directive (2014/67/EU) <sup>(1)</sup> could be seen.

We are of the opinion that the amendment of Directive 96/71/EC will restrict the freedom to provide services in an unjustified and disproportionate manner. Instead of being an instrument for the protection of workers it will likely be a tool for protectionist measures. With all likelihood it will render the legal institution of posting itself meaningless and will be highly detrimental to the competitiveness of the Union as a whole.

We are also concerned about the legal uncertainty of several provisions. In particular small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs) will be affected negatively by the legal uncertainty and the increased administrative burden. The 2-year long transition period does not provide sufficient time to adapt to the new rules in particular for SMEs.

We are of the position that the amendment to Directive 96/71/EC and the separate proposal on laying down special posting rules in the road transport sector (*lex specialis*) should have been treated as a package. The negotiations on the *lex specialis* are still ongoing; therefore, the amendment to Directive 96/71/EC by definition cannot be considered as a balanced text.

While only the Court of Justice of the European Union is entitled to interpret EU law, nevertheless we are of the view that application of the current posting rules to the road transport sector is doubtful. It is our understanding that this legal interpretation will be unaffected by the amendment to Directive 96/71/EC either."

### **Statement by Sweden**

"Sweden fully recognises the importance of the external dimension of the Energy union. The objectives of the Energy Union can only be met if the external and the internal dimensions of energy policy are mutually reinforcing.

Sweden welcomes in general strengthened cooperation between Egypt and the EU in the field of energy policy, in particular on energy efficiency and renewable energy. Any partnership agreement in the field of energy and climate between the EU and other countries should adhere to the ambitions of the Paris Agreement and support a transition to sustainable renewable energy. In light of EU's climate leadership, Sweden is concerned when new Partnership agreements [MoU] are established that include unqualified further developments and encourage investments in sectors such as oil. This may be counterproductive to the needed reduction in greenhouse gas emissions. Sweden is of the view that the inclusion of such sectors in any forthcoming or reassessed agreements need to be analysed thoroughly."

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### **Joint statement by Denmark and Germany**

"Denmark and Germany emphasize the importance of EU's contribution towards resource conservation and environmental sustainability through fishing only on surplus resources and preventing the overfishing of stocks within the sustainable fisheries partnership agreements. Generally, we believe that fisheries within fisheries agreements provide for improvement of sustainable fisheries.

Denmark and Germany underline that the Union must promote the respect of human rights and democratic principles when entering into bilateral agreements. This is clearly stated in the negotiating mandate to the Commission and must be clear from the protocol.

We stress the importance of complying with EU law, of which international law may be considered an integral part, when negotiating a new protocol between EU and the Kingdom of Morocco.

We note the progress made during the current fisheries protocol to document the distribution of the financial support for the fishing sector, in particular in the regions of Western Sahara, and encourage furthering this work.

A future fisheries partnership agreement and protocol between EU and the Kingdom of Morocco must respect the judgement of the European Court of Justice (Case C-266/16). Denmark and Germany expect the Council Legal Service to confirm that a negotiated agreement and protocol are in compliance with the judgement.

Taking into account the above mentioned, Denmark and Germany support the Council Decision to authorise the Commission to open negotiations on behalf of the European Union on a new partnership agreement and protocol with the Kingdom of Morocco."

Statement by Sweden

"The proposal for a Regulation of the European Parliament and of the Council amending Council Regulation (EC) No 1225/2009 will contribute to an increased level of trade protection, and thus harm the competitiveness of the EU industry."

Statement by the Netherlands

"The Netherlands can support the final agreement on the Modernisation of Trade Defence Instruments (MTDI). However, the Netherlands remains very concerned about the newly created possibility to enforce trade defense measures to be applied on the continental shelf by the Customs Authorities.

The Netherlands wants to make sure that this element of the MTDI proposal will be implemented only when the Union legislation has been amended in such a way as to facilitate the levying and collecting of duties and the necessary changes have been made to the customs IT systems in order to allow these systems to perform this new task. These changes need to be effected as part of the broader IT developments of the Multi Annual Strategic Plan (MASP) and the Union Customs Code IT work program. These conditions will have to be met in the further deliberations on the implementing act in the relevant Council working parties before its adoption."

Joint statement by Denmark and Malta

"Denmark and Malta note that the outcome on the Trade Defence Instruments Modernisation dossier is overall balanced and acceptable. Whilst accepting this outcome, we are nevertheless expressing our concern with the inclusion of the possibility of applying duties on the continental shelf.

This element was not part of the Commission proposal or the original Council position. It is disproportionate to the problem it aims to address and risks becoming an unreasonable administrative burden for certain Member States, in the form of practical monitoring, surveillance, costs and enforcement by the Customs Authorities.

In view of the work on this element, we would like to stress the need for a mechanism that is the least burdensome possible, both from the perspective of administration as well as of costs and call on the Commission to provide clarity at the earliest. The Commission should also not submit a proposal for an implementing act until all Member States are satisfied that the new provisions will be manageable in practice."
