
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### NATIONAL 2020 TARGET FOR THE REDUCTION OF POVERTY AND SOCIAL EXCLUSION














### NATIONAL 2020 TARGET FOR THE REDUCTION OF POVERTY AND SOCIAL EXCLUSION











comment	The revenu de solidarité active (RSA) scheme has been introduced in June 2009. It replaces two former social assistance benefits, the former minimum income scheme (revenu minimum d'insertion, RMI), and the lone parents benefit (allocation de parent isolé, API), and the various in-work benefits which were related to these two social assistance benefits. Notably for these reasons, the data on RMI and the data on RSA are not fully comparable. RSA was introduced in French oversee departments in 2011. Until 2016 the RSA scheme had two components (households could benefit from one or both):  - « RSA socle » is a minimun income  - « RSA activité » completes the household income from work in the case of a low income.  Only «RSA socle» is a social assistance scheme. Within the attached data, only beneficiaries of «RSA socle» are covered.  « RSA activité » was closed on the 1st of January 2016 and replaced by «Prime d'activité».  Currently the "prime d'activité" benefits 2.6 million households, including nearly 500,000 young working people, for an average amount of €160 per month.  At the end of 2018, the fixed amount of the "prime d'activité" will be increased by approximately €20 in order to reach the level of the fixed amount of the RSA which has undergone an exceptional increase of 10% from 2013 to 2017. Beyond this catch-up, a second individual bonus will be created in 2019. Paid to all workers with professional incomes at least equivalent to 0.5 of legal

minimum wage (SMIC), this bonus will reach a maximum amount of €20 to 1 SMIC in 2019. This maximum amount will be increased to 40€ in 2020 and 60€ in 2021.

The increase in the "prime d'activité" will thus offer additional purchasing power gains of up to 80 euros for workers paid at the SMIC. Combined with the abolition of unemployment and sickness contributions payable by the employee, the gain in purchasing power will reach 100 euros per month for these workers, i.e. a thirteenth month.










## NATIONAL 2020 TARGET FOR THE REDUCTION OF POVERTY AND SOCIAL EXCLUSION




