## German Info Note

On the Agenda Item "Other – Information on the high level meeting on African-Swine-Fever (ASF) on 19 January 2018 at the International Green Week" for the Agriculture Council on 29 January 2018

- At the International Green Week, Ministers of Agriculture and Veterinary Affairs of the
  countries of Bulgaria, the Czech Republic, Estonia, Germany, Hungary, Latvia, Lithuania,
  Poland, Romania, Slovakia and Slovenia and representatives from the European
  Commission, the World Organisation for Animal Health (OIE) and the Food and
  Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO) met at a conference in Berlin on 19
  January 2018 at the invitation of Federal Minister Christian Schmidt. A declaration was
  subsequently adopted.
- 2. They discussed cooperation on control and prevention of African Swine Fever (ASF) and agreed on enhanced information and cooperation as well as on the support of joint working groups.
- 3. Federal Minister Schmidt intends to inform the Agriculture Council about the key outcomes of the conference at its meeting on 29 January 2018.
- 4. The Ministers of Agriculture and Veterinary Services present stressed in particular the responsibility of the agricultural sector and hunters with respect to combating the further spread of the disease in Europe.

The human factor in the spread of the disease was highlighted as on the most serious risks. It was highlighted that further research is required, particularly in the field of epidemiology. The Global Framework for the Progressive Control of Transboundary Animal Diseases (GFTADs) for Europe, supported by the European Union, the FAO and the OIE, continues to be the leading institution for a pan-European strategy on the prevention and control of ASF.
