Distinguished Chair,

I have the honour to speak on behalf of the European Union and its Member States. Norway aligns itself with this statement. Australia and Uruguay associate themselves with this statement.

The European Union and its Member States welcome the adoption of the resolution by consensus, and thank the cosponsors for their support and all the delegations for their constructive cooperation. We would also like to express our gratitude to the Chair of the Committee of the Whole for ably leading us to conclude our work well in time and in the spirit of Vienna.

The resolution is consistent with our joint commitments to effectively addressing and countering the world drug problem, highlighting the value of access to evidence-based data and the need for strengthened data collection, including through effective UN interagency cooperation and targeted capacity building. We encourage the UN entities to continue cooperating and coordinating closely with other relevant regional and international organisations.
