



Burkina Faso: Response to IDP Crisis (2022-2024)

- 25,342 households received emergency food assistance, and 10,162 households were supported during the hunger season.
- · 805 shelters were built.
- 7,472 kits of essential NFI household items have been distributed.
- 6,472 hygiene kits have been distributed.
- 10,250 dignity kits were delivered to women of childbearing age.
- 2,239 children under the age of 5 were screened and confirmed as malnourished and cared for in Health and Social Promotion Centres or Learning and Nutritional Rehabilitation Centres.
- 21,440 family members of malnourished children took part in discussion groups and counselling sessions.
- 7,023 children aged between 6 and 23 months and 10,385 pregnant and breast-feeding women received enriched flour to prevent malnutrition.



Operational modalities facilitating ACCESS

- The Red Cross Movement is a volunteer-based network
- The movement widespread presence is organized in local committees
- · The Red Cross Movement network as the largest humanitarian organization
- Long-lasting partnership between the BRC and the BFRC
- · The same system that would normally respond to crises and natural disaster
- Decision-making power is on the national red cross society
- 2 key approaches: delegate project management and community-based interventions
- · Trustworthy relationship built through consistent and durable preparatory work

Challenges

 Increasing logistical challenges in supplying local market and delivering and distributing food, goods and essential items

 Humanitarian personnel are facing increasing challenges in moving to outreach areas



Recommendations

Advance ACCESS through the localization of aid

- Support the promotion of approaches and practices that reinforce the self-sustainability of local organizations
- Support and empower local actors through long-term investments in their institutional capacity
- Support organizations that strengthen mechanisms for more participation at local levels.
- · Facilitate the participation of local organizations at humanitarian coordination mechanisms
- Increase strategic global and flexible financial support to strengthen local humanitarian action
- Ensure that local actors receive fair overhead costs
- Simplify due diligence and compliance requirements

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Recommendations

Advance ACCESS through an enhanced protective environment

- Reprioritize protection in humanitarian and funding strategies
- Support the development of staff expertise and capabilities in the field of protection
