Following consultation of the members of the Youth Working Party, the Presidency has prepared the attached background document as the basis for the policy debate at the Education, <u>Youth</u>, Culture and Sport Council meeting on 13-14 May 2024.

## Background document

The EU Youth Dialogue is a forum for continuous joint reflection and the consultation of young Europeans on the priorities, implementation and follow-up of European cooperation in the field of youth. Next to its specific policy objectives, the dialogue supports the implementation of EU youth policy and constitutes the most important and most comprehensive youth participation mechanism in EU policy-making. This participatory process with young people and youth organisations involves policy and decision-makers, as well as experts, researchers and other relevant civil society actors from all over the European Union. The Belgian presidency team has produced a number of short videos on the matter<sup>1</sup>.

As part of the 10<sup>th</sup> cycle of the European Youth dialogue and focussing on thematic European youth goal #3 on inclusive societies, the Belgian Presidency hosted the Belgian EU Youth conference in Ghent from 2-5 March 2024.

Over three hundred and fifty attendees, most of whom were EU youth delegates, took part in the conference and in ten working groups discussed six themes<sup>2</sup> concerning inclusive societies: (1) structural barriers to inclusion, (2) the role of information, (3) health and mental wellbeing, (4) formal inclusive learning environments, (5) non-formal and informal inclusive learning environments and (6) challenging discriminatory attitudes and cultures. The work during the conference was based on the consultation report<sup>3</sup>, which reflects the views and opinions of more than 28.000 young people.

The aim was to create a robust foundation for political action, using the outcomes of these discussions as powerful tools to shape policies across Europe. The conference led to three distinct outcomes, as included in the Council conclusions on inclusive societies for young people (doc. 8673/24) and annex 3 of the Final Conference Report<sup>4</sup>

- 1. **Recommendations:** Six recommendations emerged from discussions within the conference's working groups. These recommendations cover various aspects of inclusion, including on the six themes mentioned above. A dedicated editing team, consisting of a youth representative of the Belgian National Youth Councils, a representative of the European Youth Forum, the researchers involved in analysing the outcomes of the consultation process, an expert from SALTO Inclusion and Diversity, and a Presidency representative, drafted and refined these recommendations based on input and feedback of the participants from conference participants. The recommendations have been incorporated in the Council conclusions on inclusive societies for young people.
- 2. Possible implementing measures: Young people directly proposed thirty-four possible implementing measures to put the six recommendations into practice. These measures aim to translate the youth ideas outlined in the recommendations into tangible actions. Each proposed measure specifies the policy level at which it could potentially be implemented. These proposals are put forward for the consideration of the European Union and its Member States and have been added to the annex of the Council conclusions on inclusive societies for young people.

3. **Call for monitoring of and feedback on the EUYD:** A critical aspect highlighted in the conference was the need for appropriate and suitable mechanisms to monitor the follow-up to EU Youth Dialogue outcomes and to provide feedback to young people. This is essential to uphold the European Union's commitment to its youth and maintain a genuine dialogue between young people and policymakers.<sup>5</sup> This call is also reflected in the Council conclusions on inclusive societies.

As the aim of the EU Youth conference, organised by the Belgian presidency as part of the 10<sup>th</sup> EUYD cycle was to create a solid foundation for political action, using the outcomes of these discussions as powerful tools to shape policies across Europe, the Belgian Presidency would like to invite Ministers to reflect on the following questions (allocated speaking time for each Member State: 3 minutes)<sup>6</sup>.
