75 Years of UDHR & 25 Years of HRD Declaration

Progress:

- Developed frameworks for HRD protection.
- Normalized and supported HRD roles globally.
- Specific regional mechanisms for Environmental Land and Indigenous.

Impact of HRDs:

- Protected and claimed rights, expanded justice and fairness.
- Women's Rights , LGBTIQ+ rights, Climate Justice

Challenges:

- Significant risks remain: nearly 3000 HRDs killed in the last decade.
- Gap between rhetorical and practical support for HRDs.










In 2023, the HRD Memorial documented the killings of 300 HRDs in 28 countries.





Defending LGBTIQ+ Rights

GLOBAL RISKS

LGBTIQ+ defenders at risk worldwide.

Increasing number of homophobic legislations targeted LGBTIQ+ persons and fuelled severe backlash against HRDs

2023: 14 LGBTIQ+ HRDs killed in 3 countries.

EUROPE AND CENTRAL ASIA

Most Targeted group 17%

Russia's framing "international LGBT movement" as "extremist"

AFRICA

20%: 22% of violations against LGBTIQ+ defenders.




