




Survey to HEIs in May - July 2023

State of play:

Joint delivery appears to be strategic, but limited in scale

- A distinctive feature of internationalisation à l'européenne
- Feasible in most institutions, but might be cumbersome
- No straightforward track due to system- and institutional-level rules and structures
- Challenges known and documented since a long while:
 - Quality assurance or accreditation
 - Conferring qualification
 - Definitions of curriculum, credits, related workload
 - Recognition
 - Financing
 - Etc.
- Up to now, a relatively small part of the degree education offer in Europe:
 - ✓ Only about half of the institutions that offer such delivery have five or more joint programmes or joint degrees.
 - ✓ Student numbers in these programmes and degrees tend to be quite low.

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Generally, the recent developments in higher education (EUI, ES4U, HE package) marked a shift in policy attention:

- ✓ Focus on higher education institutions
- ✓ Transnational cooperation between institutions (beyond individual mobility)
 how HEIs reach goals together
- ✓ Highlighted and provided focus on still-existing challenges to seamless cooperation

The HE package

EUA's view:

EUA welcomes the call:

- ✓ for full implementation of already agreed tools for QA/recognition at European level
- ✓ for streamlined and fit-for-purpose processes for joint education offers, in a transnational cooperation context
- ✓ for a renewed commitment to parity of esteem between tasks related to the university missions (L&T, research, service to society) + engagement in international activities

Requires further and strategic reflection on higher education systems, in a holistic way, and how to work across systems.

Shows how institutional autonomy is key in addressing transnational cooperation

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Caveats and ways further

- A European degree (label) will not solve structural issues encountered by joint programmes/degrees. Further and better implemented system-level reforms will be needed (adoption of the European Approach to QA of joint programmes; more coherent use of ECTS, etc.)
 - ✓ Reviewing regulatory development needs and assessing potential solutions to address identified barriers, to avoid overregulation?
- The diversity (and complementarity) of transnational cooperation activities (within/outside those supported by the EC) should be recognised to achieve the goal of international experience for all graduates.
 - ✓ Opportunities to facilitate cooperation for all universities benefits for the entire HE sector
 - √ The academic purpose of the cooperation is core
- How to advance with the implementation of all agreed reforms in the entire EHEA.
- Adequate and efficient support (notably through funding programmes and funding autonomy to allocate resources to various types and formats of cooperation)

The goal?

Europe and its universities need a smooth and effective system for transnational cooperation



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
