**European Union's application letter to become a member of the
International Coral Reef Initiative**

Dear Sirs and Madams,

As the member of the European Commission in charge of Environment, Oceans and Fisheries, I have the honour to express on behalf of the European Union its interest in applying for membership in the International Coral Reef Initiative (ICRI).

The Union shares and supports the objectives of ICRI as outlined in its foundational documents *A continuing call for action 2013* and *A framework for action 2013*:

- The Union fully supports the importance of awareness raising bringing the spotlight on the value of coral reefs and their related ecosystems as well as on their increased vulnerability.
- The Union fully supports the need for a collective and coordinated action addressing all aspects and challenges related to corals.
- The Union also acknowledges the importance of furthering integrated management practices in a manner that recognises the connectivity of land and sea and the cumulative impacts of anthropogenic pressures, including threats from climate change. It also acknowledges that protecting coral reefs can significantly reduce some of these threats such as coastal flooding and storm surges.
- The Union stands ready to help build capacity with regards to all aspects of the conservation and sustainable use of marine resources for the benefit of all. The Union will continue to support and highlight globally the crucial role that reef-associated fisheries play for millions of small-scale fishers and coastal communities around the world, in respect for their income, food security and nutrition.
- The Union recognises the importance of research and monitoring to assess the status of coral reefs and inform management practices. For years, the Union has been supporting research projects, the results of which can contribute to the objectives of ICRI and its members.
- The Union values the importance of reviewing actions and adopting adaptive policies.

The Union appreciates the added value of ICRI as a forum for regular discussion on the management of coral reefs and related ecosystems.

In a spirit of partnership, the Union would welcome the opportunity to exchange information and best practices with organisations and countries sharing the same aims and goals. The Union trusts ICRI members can benefit from its experience in supporting many coral-related initiatives either in the field of research or by providing support to specific regions of the world, as already mentioned.

The Union also believes its long-standing and strong experience in the sustainable management of fisheries, including the protection of vulnerable marine ecosystems, as well as its robust internal environmental legislation resulting in the world's highest environment standards, would be an asset for ICRI.

ICRI membership would complement the efforts made by the Union on the international scene to promote a better ocean governance, call for stronger climate change policy and confirm its determination to protect and restore biodiversity and reverse the degradation of ecosystems.

The Union has also taken due note of the membership rules.
