In light of the latest international judicial developments, the Republic of Cyprus holds the view that it is of utmost importance for the European Union to issue a statement on the reference to the "British Indian Ocean Territory" in paragraph (4) of Article FINPROV.1 of the Agreement. It has to be clear that any reference to "BIOT" is to be understood in full accordance with international law, both conventional and customary, as construed and implemented by international judicial bodies.

We also take note of the assurances provided that we will revert and address this issue.

2. Division of competences between the EU and its member states, in relation to air transport:

The division of competences between the EU and its member states, in relation to air transport, is explicitly governed by the Treaties and the Court's jurisprudence. The exercise of the Union's competence through the Trade and Cooperation Agreement, in the area of air services, shall be without prejudice to the competence of member states concerning air traffic rights, in any ongoing or future negotiations, signature or conclusion of international agreements with any third country, in the area of air services and shall not constitute a precedent to this effect."

Statement by the Commission

"The Commission considers that the above mentioned 'Union submission' to be submitted to the IMO is covered by EU exclusive competence. Submission of proposals to the IMO on issues of EU competence is an act of external representation and should be made by the Commission on behalf of the EU to the IMO. It should therefore be sent to the IMO by the Commission.

In the Commission's view, the procedural arguments against presenting submissions to the IMO by the Commission on behalf of the EU are not convincing. This is because there is no evidence to suggest that the IMO, as a specialised agency of the United Nations, would be in a position to reject such a submission.

The Commission thus maintains its position that the Treaty provisions on external representation of the Union should be applied. Consequently, the only legally correct way forward is to present the submission in question to the IMO by the European Commission on behalf of the European Union. The Commission reserves all its rights in this regard."

"The Commission considers that, in order to ensure consistency, the methodology of Annex VI of the Regulation establishing a Recovery and Resilience Facility should be incorporated in the Common Provisions Regulation."

Statement by Malta

"Malta welcomes the formal adoption of the Recovery and Resilience Facility (RRF) Regulation. Nevertheless, Malta reiterates the concerns raised previously namely in relation to the climate tracking methodology and the overall complex nature of the instrument. With regard to the climate tracking methodology, while taking due note of the CION's position and statement, Malta regrets that this was not discussed in Council, and also regrets that investments in road infrastructure are assigned a zero coefficient. Malta recalls that its unique national circumstances and limited emissions reduction potential make investments in more efficient road infrastructure, in conjunction with the electrification of vehicles, one of the few key opportunities for Malta to continue building on a holistic approach towards decarbonisation and progress towards climate neutrality. These same national circumstances are also the main contributing factor to the absence of railways. Malta therefore stresses that agreement on the RRF should not in any way prejudice the upcoming discussions on Annex I of the Common Provisions Regulation.

Malta also regrets that the RRF progressively developed into a substantially more complex instrument than originally intended, featuring multiple conditions and reporting obligations to abide to in order to be accessed. In this respect and particularly in terms of the formulation of National Recovery and Resilience Plans and their assessment, Malta recalls the importance of CION maintaining a realistic and pragmatic approach, as previously announced."

Joint statement by Sweden and the Netherlands

"Sweden and the Netherlands

- Strongly regret that the estimated error rate for the expenditures observed by the European Court of Auditors ("the Court") were found to be both material and pervasive and have led to an adverse opinion on the legality and regularity of expenditures for the year 2019.
- Regret that, for years, the error rate reported by the Court remains above the materiality threshold of 2%. This signifies that the implementation of the EU budget is not according to standards we all have agreed upon. Marginal improvements, while a large sum of the EU budget remains prone to high levels of error, are not sufficient.
- Find the adverse opinion by the Court a clear sign that requires adequate action to be taken by both the European Commission and the Member states.
- Therefore call upon both the European Commission and the Member States to attach great value to the recommendations made by the Court, especially regarding reimbursement-based payments and the management and control of the EU budget.
- See the evaluation of the performance of the EU budget, and the results achieved, as an essential and integral part of the annual evaluation as it is described in Article 318 TFEU.
- Are concerned about the lack of efficiency and effectiveness in parts of EU expenditure and the issues related to performance highlighted by the Court. A responsible and efficient use of EU-funds is especially important given the increased ambition in the MFF and of the Recovery package. To ensure trust and legitimacy it is essential that the EU-budget efficiently delivers true value to EU-citizens.
- This calls for implementing less complex funding rules and implementation procedures, increased efforts to promote transparency and reliability of audits and making Member States' annual control reports publicly available."
