- Present since 2014, working across multiple regions – currently mainly the eastern frontline crescent.
- Focus on frontline response, support to evacuees, longer term solutions for displaced people and increased access, protection and freedom of movement for people in Occupied Territories
- Assisted more than 1.5 million people since 2022

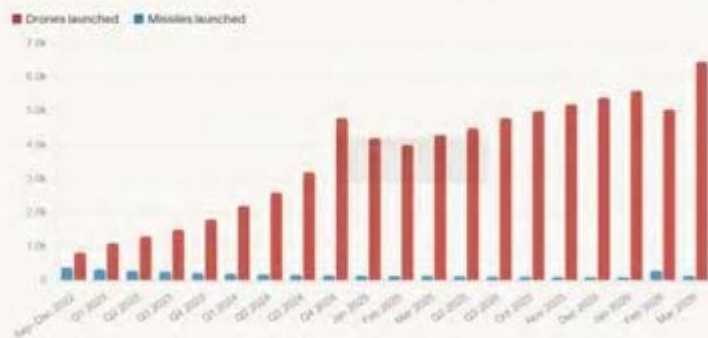

Intensified conflict and advances in drone technology are driving more civilian casualties

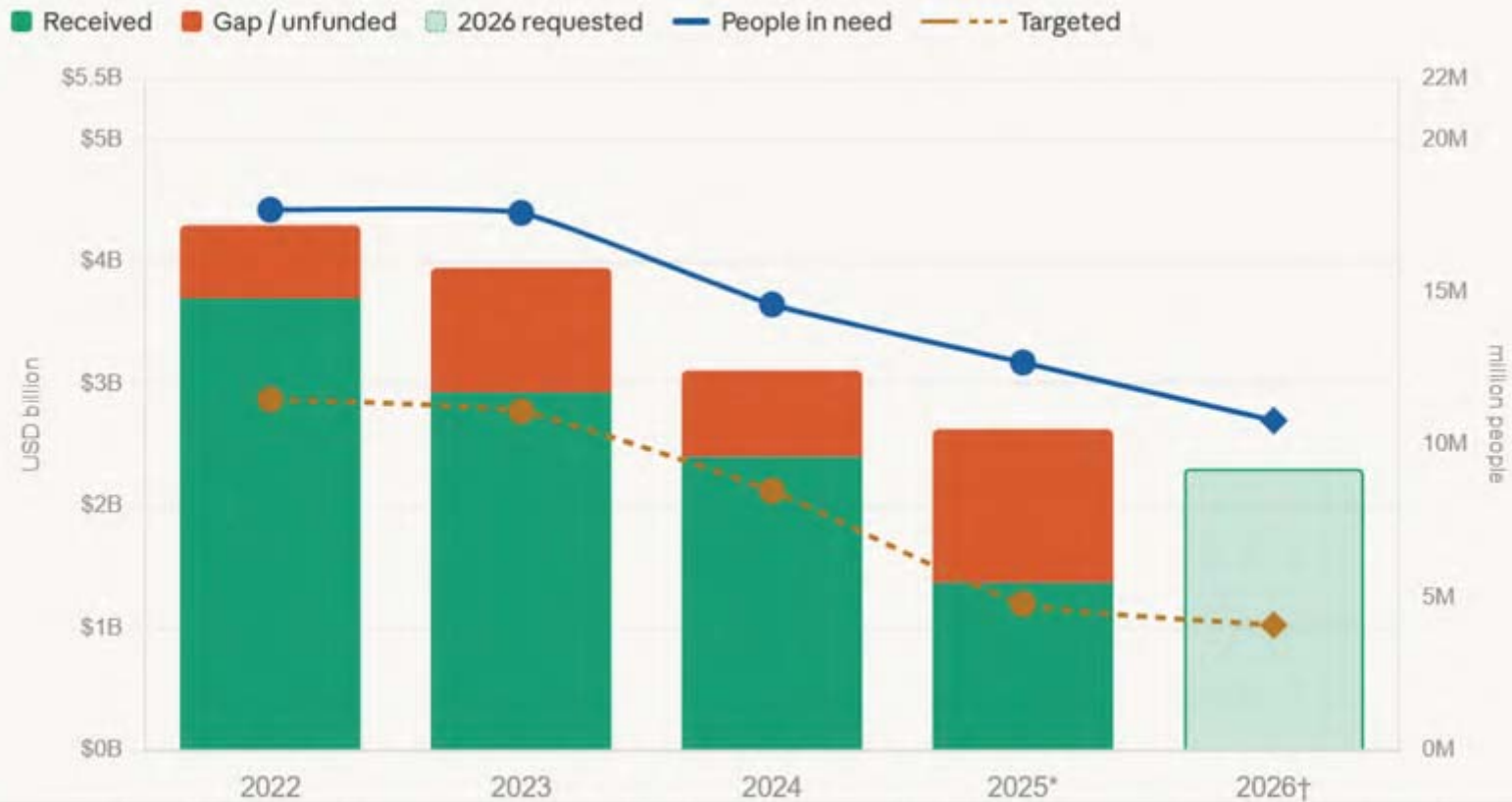
Drones launched (Sep 2022-Dec 2024) **14,700+**
Record month (Mar 2026) **6,462**
Avg interception rate (Mar 2026) **~90%**

Funding (bars, left axis) vs people in need & targeted (lines, right axis) OCHA / Claude AI



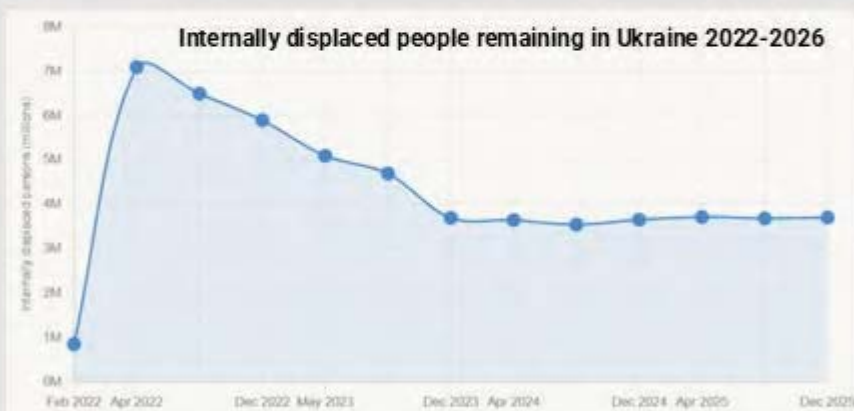
Needs are deepening while humanitarian funding is reducing



Limited funding is resulting in...

- Hyper-prioritisation resulting in assistance reaching only one-third of people in need (3.6 of 10.8 million)
- Reduced operational footprints
- Risk leaving vulnerable groups behind
- Growing disparities in assistance between frontline and non-frontline areas
- Less focus on longer term solutions with humanitarian funds

Lack of longer-term solutions delays evacuations and makes people return to unsafe areas

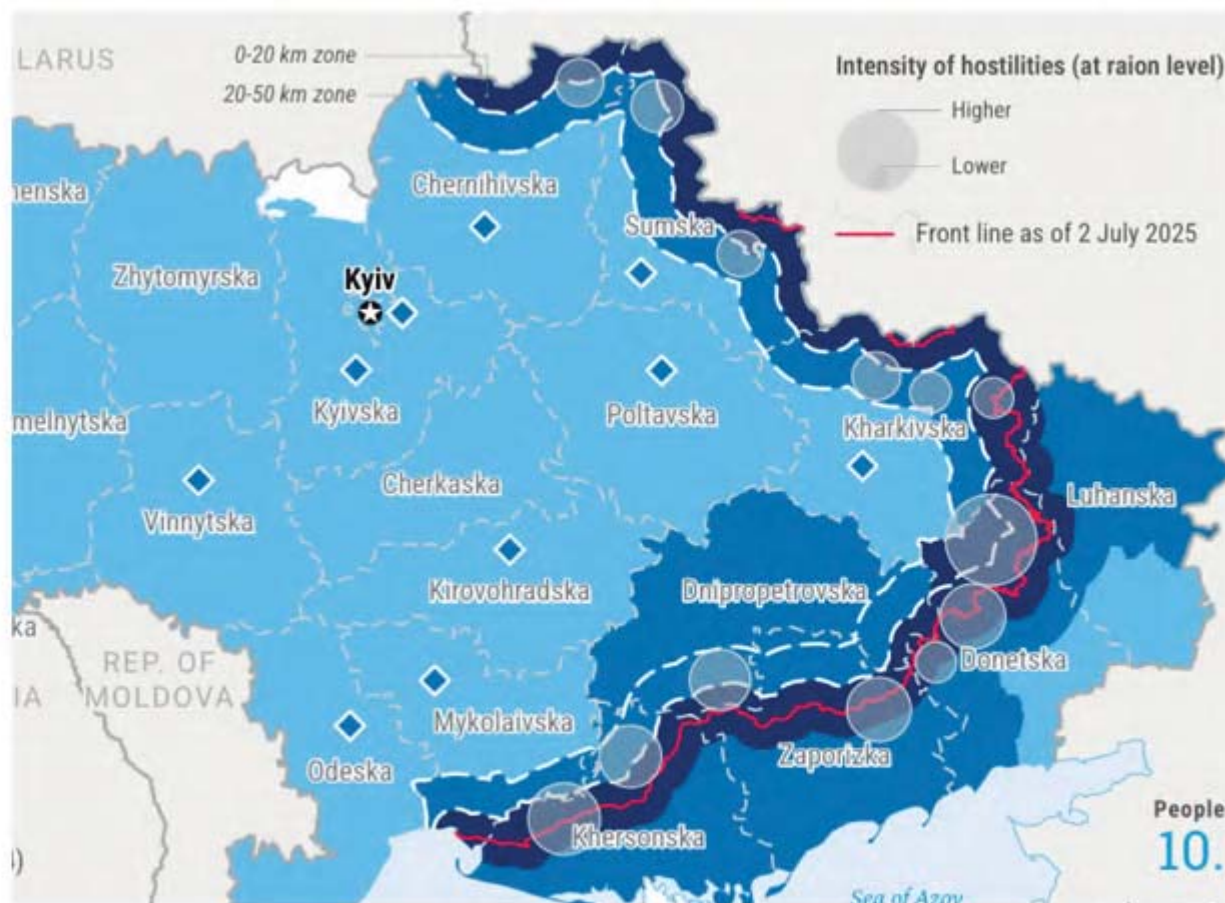


IOM Displacement Tracking Matrix (DTM)



The hidden crisis in Occupied Territories

- One million people in need
- Needs comparable to the most affected frontline regions
- Severely limited access to services, assistance, and safe movement
- Coping capacity significantly reduced



OCHA / HNRP 2026

Key messages for the EU and Member States

- **Engage with parties to the conflict to safeguard civilians and respect IHL** – including in areas under occupation
- **Sustain humanitarian funding** to enable hyper-prioritised HNRP implementation in full
- **Encourage development, recovery and humanitarian actors to jointly find solutions** for IDPs and returnees
- **Support humanitarian action in Occupied Territories**
- **Ensure diplomatic engagement on cessation of hostilities includes humanitarian considerations**, particularly freedom of movement
